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## Executive summary

The HPC is a health regulator and our main aim is to protect the public. The HPC currently regulates 13 professions. All of these professions have at least one professional title which is protected by law. The HPC keeps a register of health professionals who meet our standards for their training, professional skills, behaviour and health.

As well as approving educational programmes for people who want to join the Register, the HPC also approve a small number of programmes for those already on the Register. This includes Prescription only Medicine (POM) post-registration programmes for chiropodists / podiatrists.

The education provider requested to run the POM component of their approved pre-registration training programme as a standalone POM programme. The Education and Training Committee made the decision that the remainder of the standards of education and training are already met through the approval of the pre-registration training programme and that it is just the selection and entry criteria for the direct entry onto a standalone POM programme that needed to be approved separately.

The education provider was required to submit a specific major change submission, which focused on section two of our standards of education and training – admissions.

The major change visitors' report which follows outlines the recommended outcome made by the visitors on the approval of the programme. The visitors' recommended outcome is that there is sufficient evidence to show that the programme meets section two of the standards of education and training and those who complete the programme demonstrate an ability to meet the following standard of proficiency:

Be able to use systematic approach to formulate and test a preferred diagnosis including being able to - administer relevant prescription-only medicines, interpret any relevant pharmacological history and recognise potential consequences for patient treatment.
